Skin testing procedure instructions:

The appointment can take between 1-2 hours. NO ANTIHISTAMINES 5-7 days before your appointment.

Medications that interfere with skin testing:

As part of your visit to our office, we may skin test you for allergies. We ask that you look over this list of medications as they may interfere with the skin testing. If you are on any of these currently and can stop them 5-7 days prior to your appointment, please do. Please note that most over the counter cough medicines and prescription cough medicines contain antihistamines. If possible, please stop these cough medicines 5 days before the appointment also. All other daily medicines should be continued.
